Itasca Area AIS Summit – WCOLA is a sponsor of this annual event. The purpose of the Summit is to raise AIS awareness, partner with resorts, lake service providers, bait shops, area fishing guides, recruit FiveStar Initiative participants, and discuss AIS best practices. This year the Itasca AIS Program has decided to focus on both Resorts and Lake Service Providers. The idea is to be specific regarding what resorts and lake service providers can do to help prevent the spread of AIS within Itasca County. This year's Summit will be held from 9-10:00 am, Wed. Mar 24 online via Zoom. Zoom information will be posted on the WCOLA Facebook page when it is received.

AIS Decontamination Unit

The fund-raising for the AIS Decontamination Station continues, to date we have raised over \$24,000 towards our goal for purchasing, operating, and staffing the unit. WCOLA is undertaking this effort in collaboration with Wabana Township and Itasca County Soil & Water AIS department.

The AIS decontamination unit will be housed at the township hall, which is centrally located between both Wabana landings, and could be used by anyone requesting or needing the service before or after visiting another body of water either in the Township or elsewhere.

An AIS Decontamination Station is another tool in preventing AIS from entering the Wabana township lakes and surrounding area lakes by allowing both lakeshore owners and the public to decontaminate a boat that is entering the lakes in the township. With the funds raised, we hope to purchase a unit, help fund assistance to staff the location, and also have WCOLA and the township actively requesting the public by newspaper or radio to stop by the unit to increase its usage.

Currently our committee is researching various options on available equipment, with a goal of full implementation by spring ice-out. We are also looking for volunteers and part-time workers to staff the unit during the week, training for operating the unit will be provided. If you are interested in being an operator, please contact Mark Conover.

Light Pollution

Please, not here! Our Disappearing night sky

Communication from Jeanne Burke – WCOLA member, reprinted with request and permission.

Melancholic personality types can be an odd lot. They are usually driven by some passion and appear to the phlegmatic type as overly emotional and involved. Let me introduce myself, Jeanne Burke, as the melancholic partner in my marriage to my phlegmatic husband, Dan.

What is my passion you ask? Having discovered this area three years ago, I am anxious to be a good steward to the small parcel of land we own and the lake it borders, Lake Wabana. However, my greatest passion is to preserve our night sky.

Several years ago, I joined a crusade across America to save the night sky. I read an article in the newspaper written by Dan Green, an amateur astronomer from the east coast, who became alarmed at America's rapidly advancing light pollution. To counter this advance, he founded The New England Light Pollution Advisory Group. I agreed with Dan Green and saved his article for reference.

I probably would have remained an armchair crusader if something had not happened soon afterward that made me actively join his crusade. The city planners of Chanhassen, where I live, informed me about their plans for my neighborhood. The city was going to put in new streetlights, the very ones Dan Green had warned cause light trespass, glare and pollute the night sky by radiating upwards and out rather than down.

With Dan Green's newspaper article and recommendations from the internet www.nelpag.org, I was not only able to stop the city from replacing our neighborhood streetlights, but I was able to direct the city planners to establish a light ordinance for Chanhassen.

I wish I could tell you it was a great victory but the ordinance came too late. Chanhassen had already installed numerous offending streetlights, towering athletic field lights, glaring advertising lights, and approved even more polluting lights on its newer buildings. It's a sorry sight! Don't bother to look up at the stars because they are barely visible. You will never be able to show the Milky Way to your children or grandchildren from Chanhassen.

Here, up North, however, the night sky still reflects the majestic masterpiece of God's creation. The stars are so bright against the dark sky, and the Milky Way is clearly seen. How can we be good stewards of this night sky?

First, evaluate your property in terms of light pollution. Keep outside lights, if any, to a minimum. If you desire an outside light, install a fixture where the light is recessed and deflects light downward. These same guidelines also apply to lights installed on a house, garage or pole barn. If you presently have lights that pollute, make changes or consider infrequent use of these lights.

Somehow, we have learned to associate darkness with crime. You may be surprised to learn that studies have shown that most burglaries occur not under the cover of darkness, but during the day when people are away at work.

Anyone can help keep the night dark. You don't need to be an astronomer or even like stargazing. You can just be nice, like my husband Dan, and want to pass on to future generations something rapidly disappearing, the dark night sky.

Dan, knowing my passion for darkness, made some welcome changes on our property. He dug out the tall light pole near our dock, disconnected the floodlight on our pole barn, and put environmentally friendly fixtures on the house. Small changes can make great improvements in the degree of darkness.

As association members, I am hoping we can support one another on this environmental concern. I remember what one Chanhassen planner said to me, "Honestly Jeanne, I never thought about light pollution, but you are absolutely right. As city planners, we've never asked questions about lighting."

I am aware of the light pollution that is rapidly encroaching on Grand Rapids. In the past three years, I have notice Grand Rapids emitting more and more light pollution. If we do not take steps to protect our darkness, the scourge of light pollution will overtake us. The Dark Sky Association is always looking for new members. Their goal is to educate the public and guide communities in implementing correct lighting.

Last year, while camping on Burntside Lake, which is north of Ely, I saw the night sky polluted with artificial lights. Above the horizon, I could see the pink haze of light pollution from Ely and higher in the sky a searchlight from a distant casino arced every tenth second.

My sense of wonder gave way to agitation as the timed searchlight intruded on what would have been a still peaceful panorama. I felt a sense of loss for something that was once so magnificent, our window to the universe of a billion trillion stars.

The Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness (BWCAW) is now an INTERNATIONAL DARK SKY SANCTUARY. The BWCAW was awarded this distinction in 2020 by the International Dark-sky Association (IDA).

The Wabana Township Comprehensive Plan has been approved by the Township Board at the January 6, 2021 meeting, can be found at the Wabana Township website (http://wabanatownship.com/) or the direct link (https://wabanatownship.com/wp-content/uploads/2021/01/Wabana-Comp-Plan-final.pdf).

The plan is the result of an 18-month effort by the volunteer Advisory Committee (Deb Kee, Jim Olijnek, Gary Oja, Bob Moore, Wayne Speedling, Steve Melin, and Steve Bjerke) and was developed with Wabana Township citizen inputs.

The plan's intent is *to preserve and improve the character and quality of life in the Township.* To achieve the intent, Wabana Township Comprehensive Plan has identified 4 goals and 13 strategies with action plans.

The volunteer Township Planning Commission is tasked with initiating and monitoring the strategies and action plan activities, and will be soliciting your help in achieving our goals. Please consider helping with your time & talents with Volunteer requests that will be published in future editions of this newsletter, the Warbler, and postings on the Township's website, or you may contact Steve Melin via email if you are interested.

Many of the meetings for these efforts will be held via Zoom, so you do not have to be inperson to be part of the group.
